For each pair of equations, decide whether the given value of x is a solution to one or both equations.

1. $x = 2$

a. $x(2 + 3) = 10$

b. $2x + 3x = 10$

2. $x = 3$

a. $x - 4 = 1$

b. $4 - x = 1$

3. $x = -2$

a. $7x = -14$

b. $x \cdot 14 = -28$

4. $x = -1$

a. $x + 3 = 2$

b. $3 + x = 2$

5. $x = -5$

a. $3 - x = 8$

b. $5 - x = 10$

6. $x = (8 + 1) + 3$

a. $\frac{12}{2} = \frac{1}{2}(x)$

b. $18 = 2x$

7. $x = 2$

a. $\frac{12}{x} = 6$

b. $6x = 12$

8. $x = \frac{10}{3}$

a. $-1 + 3x = 9$

b. $9 = 3x - 1$

9. $x = \frac{1}{2}$

a. $5(x + 1) = \frac{15}{2}$

b. $5x + 1 = \frac{15}{2}$

3. For each change that your partner makes, listen carefully to the explanation about why the new equation is equivalent. If you disagree, discuss your thinking and work to reach an agreement.
