## Activity 1

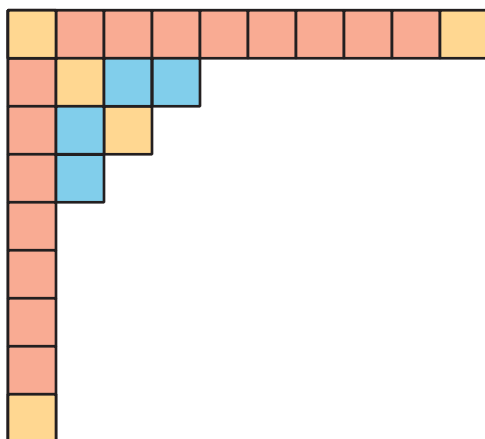
### Partially Tiled

## Activity 2

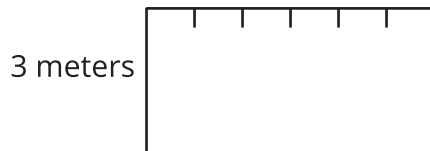
### No More Squares
